





Green Experiences in Jerusalem

Prepared for the Israel Ministry of Tourism by the Jerusalem Green Fund

Jerusalem's heritage takes us back to Biblical times, when the Israelites would ascend on foot three times a year, bringing their tithes. In the period of the Second Temple, Jerusalem offered hospitality to half a million pilgrims for the Feasts of Passover, Pentecost and Tabernacles. Food for these visitors was grown on multiple agricultural terraces in the green Jerusalem Hills, and the bird and animal life from that time can still be seen today.


Today's tourists feel a need to conduct their trips in a sustainable and responsible way. This selection offers opportunities to leave a positive footprint, as they explore the Holy City through a green lens.




1. Green Sites to Visit



Jerusalem is blessed with many sites and visitors' centers, making natural and human landscapes very accessible to tourists.



Most of these sites demonstrate the fruits of community entrepreneurship, and responsible tourists will enjoy hearing these success stories of community initiatives.



6. Green Pilgrimage Options for the Three Religions



The proposed routes are not new, but approaching pilgrimage as a green and sustainable experience is a novelty for the average tourist. According to this philosophy, the pilgrims (or tourists hiking in their footsteps) meet local communities, are exposed to the natural biblical surroundings, and leave a positive footprint thanks to their engagement in volunteer work.


The Jerusalem Green Fund has trained guides in the spirit of green pilgrimage, who can help to coordinate your visit. The Jerusalem Green Fund is developing a whole array of volunteering activities along the routes.
